

- 6. Decision of the judges is final. Area II reserves the right to select entries that, in its sole judgment, are suitable for its festivals' purpose.

ARE YOUR HANDBELLS INSURED?

On August 28, 2004, a stubborn cloudburst hovered over our little town of Everett, in south central Pennsylvania, for several long hours. Water from a tiny stream that flows through town, and underneath the Everett Church of the Brethren, began to overflow its banks. After breaking through a church basement window, floodwater was soon surging down into the entire basement, to a depth of several feet.

Unfortunately, our 4-octave set of handbells and newly purchased choir chimes were stored in a low cupboard in the Music Room in the church basement. By the time firemen reached the basement to pump out water and save our instruments, the bell cases were floating inside the locked cupboards. Muddy water poured from them when they were finally carried upstairs to safety. Even though they were immediately removed from the cases, dried and cleaned by church members, extensive damage had already been done.

Because our insurance policy for the handbells had been vaguely written..."4 octave instruments," it was quite a struggle to recover insurance payments for the refurbishing the entire set of damaged bells and choir chimes. The company finally agreed to pay for new cases also, after documentation that cases are necessary for storage of the bells. No payment was made for hundreds of dollars worth of music lost in the flooded file cabinets and other damaged items that had to be thrown away.

We strongly suggest that churches and organizations check their insurance policies to cover present *replacement costs* in case of loss. Compare prices in a supply catalog to figure what it would take to replace all your present octaves of handbells, choir chimes and cases, plus all equipment necessary; tables, pads, covers, notebooks, gloves, mallets, music, etc. The final price may surprise you, as costs have increased through the years.

Our handbells and all equipment are now stored safely upstairs, and we had to find a new practice room. Once again, we are back to ringing, thankful that our church stewards had the foresight to have some insurance coverage for our precious instruments. From now on, the policy will include a clearly written itemized list of *all* replacement costs. From our sad experience, we encourage those involved in handbell programs to annually review storage space, plan for quick removal of equipment in case of an emergency, and have an up to date, accurate insurance policy!
